 All the heads of the department in consultation with their faculty members prepare a lesson plan with an academic calendar before the commencement of the session. • The course content is split and rearranged in lecture sequence keeping in mind the conceiving power and convenience of the learners, Each Honours paper is split into 60-65 lecture of 50 minutes and 40-45 lectures of subsidiary & language papers. • It is ensured that teachers move from easy to difficult, familiar to unfamiliar and at a pace that is easy for learners to maintain. • After the meetings of the different depts. The copy of the syllabus is distributed to the respective teachers. Every teacher draws his / her teaching plan broadly taking into consideration the ability of his / her students. These plans are reviewed and rechecked if needed. • The copy of the syllabus and lesson plan is also pasted by the teachers in the daily progress Register for ready reference. • Class test is conducted at the end of each paper in a form of viva, seminar, quiz or in written form. • IQAC committee periodically discuss the academic activities with heads of the departments and takes the account of organizing important academic events like In-house Seminars, Workshops, Debates, Group Discussions, Celebration of festivals. · Time schedules along with teaching plans are prepared by the departments within the framework of the academic calendar issued by the university. Teaching plans are regularly reviewed and restructured, if any change comes in working days. • The principal meets the heads of the Departments to ensure that syllabi are adequately covered. • The subject teacher assess the students through written class test, class debate group discussion, Question Answer sessions. • PG Department of Home Science: Curriculum design delivery and documentation once the curriculum was prescribed by the committee, It was followed by every following semester before completion of every semester, The PG department of Home science/parent conducts internals whereby the students are evaluated on there given assignment attendance personality development and coordinator activities. The examination schedule is prepared by the University which is uploaded on the website of the university and college as well as on the notice board the question paper for the theory examination is prepared by the faculty member of PG department of home science of other University. • The chalk-and-talk method of teaching is supplemented by the use of LCD Projectors, Internet browsing, and other practical supplementary aids. • Students meetings are organized to encourage them to attend class discussions, seminars. • The students are encouraged to participate in cultural and sports activities, join NSS and participate in outreach activities. • Revision classes are also scheduled at the end of academic session. • List of holidays is provided by university. • Master time -table is displayed in principal's chamber and student's Notice-Board.
