The procedure and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities are performed for a streamlined effect laboratory. The various UG laboratory like physics, chemistry, botany and zoology are provided with contingency by the college. Contingency fund is given to meet urgent expenditure of the laboratory and its practical work. The government of Bihar granted a sum of rupees 4 lakhs for the upgradation of the UG practical laboratory of physics, chemistry, botany and zoology. The PG department of Home science and psychology is provided with the regular contingency fund from the college. Books in the library are provided frequently through MP fund. Government of Bihar provided an amount of rupees 2 lakhs for the purchase of general books. Sports complex is maintained by the fund provided by RUSA. Computer maintenance is practiced. The computer is kept unrestricted and is protected from potential threats like viruses, malware and hard drive failure. The college repair the computers if and when needed by providing the necessary fund. The hostel and classrooms are routinely maintained and renovation under RUSA funding is being done.
